Audubon Minnesota's Third Annual **Chimney Swift Sit**

Volunteers are needed to participate in Audubon Minnesota's Third Annual Chimney Swift Sit for an hour on any day during July 29-August 1, or August 26-29.

Chimney Swift populations have declined 54% over the past 40 years. This species is important to the environment, as each day Chimney Swifts consume onethird of their weight in flying insects, such as mosquitoes and flies, making them a natural insect control. The data that volunteers collect will help us better understand the distribution of migrating Chimney Swifts in Minnesota.

Here's how the Sit works: Participants "sit" near a chimney they know or suspect has swifts, for about an hour any day between July 29-August 1, or August 26-29. They count/estimate the number of chimney swifts entering a roosting site, and record the data. Volunteers can count on one night or on several nights during the designated period. In addition to the Sit, Audubon Minnesota is promoting Chimney Swift conservation efforts by educating chimney owners about the habitat needs of Chimney Swifts, and facilitating the building of new structures specifically for use by these birds as nest and roost sites. The Chimney Swift was just declared an endangered species in Nova Scotia this past year and we hope our efforts through research and education will help halt the decline here in Minnesota.

Rhino and Zebra Conservation in Namibia

Namibia's critically endangered black rhino and the vulnerable Hartmann's mountain zebra are the focus of two important conservation projects supported by the Minnesota Zoo. Zoo staffers are working in the



southwestern African nation to assist with efforts to turn around declines in these two species' populations.


Tara Harris, who holds a doctorate in biological anthropology, will discuss how the black market demand for rhino horn has led to a catastrophic decline. And, with only about 9,000 mountain zebras remaining, efforts are underway to create a sustainable population.

With a long history in Namibia, the Minnesota Zoo seeks to broaden its contribution to global conservation efforts. In Namibia zoo staff are joining forces with local

> communities, local and international conservation organizations, and the Namibian government to support conservation efforts for these two iconic species.

Spoonbilled Sandpiper in Danger In the

arctic tundra of eastern

Russia, a sparrow-sized shorebird is facing extinction — and a few scientists are doing all they can to save it. In recent years the Spoon-billed Sandpiper's population has dropped a staggering 25% per year. Fewer than 200 pairs now remain. Shorebird experts from the Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust and Birds Russia are enacting an emergency plan to begin a captive breeding program.

The Spoon-billed Sandpiper is likely the most critically endangered bird species in the world. It breeds on remote coastal tundra and migrates to through key staging sites in Kamchatka, Korea, and Japan. It winters across South China, Vietnam, Thailand, Myanmar, and Bangladesh.
