### JANUARY MEMBER MEETING

"Today's Office" with Sharon Stiteler, Bird Blogger and Storyteller

### January 10, 2013

Sharon's goal is to get paid go bird watching. Her "offices" have been in such places as laying in the middle of a corn field watching eagles, flying 100 ft above the Mississippi River to count ducks. Her talk is based on her popular blog entries, including the "Horned Guan Death March" (climbing 4 hours up a volcano in Guatemala to search for a rare tree chicken), trying to find a reasonable bathroom while birding in Kazakhstan, or misadventures while searching for an Ivory-billed Woodpecker.

Ms. Stiteler was given a *Peterson Field Guide to Birds* when she was seven years old and has loved birds ever since.

Since 1997, her goal has been to get paid to go birding. She writes the popular birding blog, www.birdchick.com. Her storytelling has been included in *The Wall Street Journal, The New York Times,* 

> WildBird Magazine, Outdoor News, Birds & Blooms, and seen on the NBC Nightly News. For several years she has made regular appearances on Twin Cities' TV and radio stations. She wrote the books Disapproving Rabbits and City Birds/Country Birds. She has also worked as a National Park Ranger, and has managed a Wild Bird Store.

### **Proposed By-laws Changes**

This is a notice of a proposed change to our Bylaws. The membership must be notified through our newsletter of any proposed Bylaws changes. The Board must then vote on the proposed changes at their next meeting. The vote will be held at the January 7, 2013 board meeting.

Section 4.4 reads as follows: No one individual shall serve for more than five consecutive years as a Board member, except (a) that the terms of Secretary and Treasurer shall be exempt from limits and (b) pursuant to Section 5.4.

The proposed modification would change one word in Section 4.4: the "five" (as in: *No one individual shall serve for more than "five" consecutive years...*) The desire is to change this word to "six."

Board officers (President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer) are elected for one year terms, but the eight atlarge Directors are elected for 2 year terms. The "five" year restriction creates a problem for the two year terms. It essentially forces the at-large Directors to step down after four years. A change to six years would allow them to complete a full third term.

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# SPAS Nominating Committee Announces 2013-2014 Officers and Board Openings

There are 12 members on the SPAS Board. The present Board members that are running for election this May are: Barb Lindeke for President, Lisa Hartwig for Secretary, Richard Newmark for Treasurer, Craig Andresen for Director and Deb Bachrach for Director. There are also two open positions for the May 2013 election: Those of Vice President and Director. Director terms are for two years; the vice-president position is for a one year term. ### A Towering Victory for Migrating Birds

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has announced it will provide new lighting standards for communication towers and other tall structures that will have an immediate and lasting benefit for birds, particularly night-migrating songbirds. According to a recent study, collisions with tall towers-some of which can reach heights of 2,000 ft-result in some 7 million bird deaths annually in the United States. Night-migrants navigating by the stars are drawn to lights on the tops and down the sides of towers over 199 ft tall that are mandated by the FAA for aircraft safety. Confused by the lights and trapped in their glow, the birds collide with the structure, each other, or the ground, or circle until they drop from exhaustion. Research has shown that flashing lights are far less likely to result in bird deaths, but until now, the FAA has required steady-burning or slowpulsing red side-marker lights on towers, which are particularly deadly.

The results showed that flashing the sidemarker lights was acceptable for small towers (up to 350 ft. tall) and that they could be omitted altogether on taller towers (over 351 ft. tall) so long as the additional bright flashing lights on top of the tower were operational. The study also found that LED lights were more effective.

### **KESTREL NESTING SITES PLUS BANDING NEWS**

The American Kestrel breeds throughout the Americas wherever it finds tree cavities for nesting and open areas with short ground cover for hunting. It is our smallest falcon, roughly the size of a Blue Jay. In urban and suburban areas, it often hunts for insects, small mammals, and small birds along roadsides or undeveloped patches. It usually hunts from a utility wire or other perch. It often hovers on the wind while scanning the ground below.

Kestrels are not rare in our area, but Breeding Bird

Surveys show that they have declined 2.1% per year in Minnesota over the past 43 years-a total decline of 59%. Audubon Minnesota's Guide to Urban Bird Conservation features the American Kestrel as one of the target species.

Where natural cavities are not available, Kestrels will use nest boxes. Audubon Minnesota is participating in a partnership with the Peregrine Fund

and others to develop a statewide kestrel nest box program.

At the Arden Hills Army Training Site (AHATS), St. Paul Audubon board member Craig Andresen has installed 13 nest boxes for kestrels over the past 14 years with great success. In a typical nesting season, seven or eight pairs of kestrels occupy Craig's nest boxes, producing about 35 to 40 young kestrels each year.

In the fall of 2011, the city of

St. Paul installed a surplus utility pole at Bruce Vento Nature Sanctuary (BVNS) for use as a kestrel nest site. Craig attached a nest box to the pole last February. Minnesota kestrels migrate south for the winter, and return in March or April. The males return first to claim a nesting territory, followed soon by the females.

When April rolled around, I visited BVNS weekly to see if any kestrels were showing interest in the nest box. On April 17TH, I was thrilled to see a kestrel looking out of the box. A week later I saw both a male and a female kestrel enter the box. On later visits, it was clear that the female was incubating eggs. Occasionally the male took a turn incubating, but he mostly provided the food, calling loudly and gliding in slowly to show off his latest catch. (He became sneakier after the eggs hatched.)

Kristin Hall and Ron Windingstad of Audubon Minnesota arranged for the Raptor Center at the U of M to band the BVNS kestrel chicks. The ideal age for banding is about 17 days after hatching. Earlier, the band may be too loose; later, the chicks might jump out of the box when it is opened, and, they can be ornery when handled. I visited more frequently toward the end of the 30-days of incubation to try to determine a hatching date.

The adults began taking food into the nest box on about May 29TH, so on June 15TH, the banding crew arrived. Kristin climbed to the nest box while Ron steadied the ladder. Kristin reached into the box and brought five chicks down to the banders, who weighed

> and measured each chick. While all of this was going on, the parent kestrels were nowhere to be seen or heard. About fifteen minutes after Kristin returned the chicks, the parents approached the box warily, and mom took a mouse inside.

The last of the young kestrels left the nest box on June 27TH. I never saw the whole family together, but the adults

and the fledglings were still in the area for at least two more weeks. In October, Craig cleaned the wood chips and mouse bones from the nest box and replaced the wood chips.

If you visit BVNS next spring, look for me

standing at a spotting scope trained on the nest box. I'll be hoping for another happy kestrel family.

The Fledging Birders' Institute

The Fledging Birders Institute sponsored a "Focus on Diversity" conference at the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge in Bloomington on Oct. 13, 2012. The National Audubon Society and the US Fish and Wildlife Service were the other lead sponsors of the conference.

Several distinguished speakers from across the country discussed the issue that is facing many nonprofit groups across the country because they have not been successful attracting minorities to their events and membership. Paul Baicich (Bird Education Network, MD) gave the first lecture and pointed out that the United States is now 63% Caucasian, 17% Hispanic, 13% African American, 5% Asian, whereas Birders are at least 92% Caucasian. Although Minnesota has far fewer minorities than the U.S. population as a whole, Minneapolis comprises 35% minorities and Chicago 64%.

The purpose of this conference was to offer examples of Hispanics and African Americans who have become active well-known bird watchers, and to propose programs to encourage more participation in bird watching by minorities.

Some metro programs mentioned at the Conference includes Belwin Nature Center, which holds a 3M grant to bring in students from every 5TH grade classroom in St. Paul. The



students participate in bird-watching activities. They also highlighted a program at the MN Valley Nature Center that brings students in for programs via Light Rail Transit.

Roy Rodriguez described several events in Texas attracting many Latino 5TH grade students. He spoke about the need for centers, such as the one he works with in south Texas, to attract local bird watchers, not just wealthy Caucasians from outside of the state. Roy works with local area teachers and students. He claims parents will not bring their children to visit nature centers, but children will bring their families!

Several minority participants talked about concerns for their safety in state parks and other bird watching areas from Texas and Arizona to Duluth. For example, Dudley Edmondson, a world class photographer, was hassled by neighbors when photographing fireweed along railroad

tracks for a photo assignment in his neighborhood in Duluth. They thought he was using his binoculars to look into their houses.

Kenn and Kim Kaufman, from the Black Swamp Bird Observatory near Toledo, Ohio, discussed liaisons with local businesses to support a birding weekend they run in May which has been very successful in raising awareness and bringing in more people, including minorities. Kenn writes the Kaufman Field Guide series.

Dan Kunkle runs the Lehigh Gap Nature Center at the base of the Kittatinny Ridge in Pennsylvania, and, he used Audubon's Together Green funding to encourage nature activities in nearby Bethlehem and Allentown. Since money was not available to transport children to Lehigh, he worked with minority parents in the nearby cities to become involved in nature and birding and work with

children in their neighborhoods.

NOTE: SPAS's Education Committee does classroom visits all year around with many St. Paul elementary and middle school science classrooms. They recently held a Birdathon competition that involved quite a few minority kids. This year they worked with the National Park Service's Big River Journey program, that served hundreds of area school kids.

Every summer, they hold a week-long Bird Camp for Kids at Como Park (right photo), and twice a year, help an area High School Science curriculum with a birding field trip at Audubon Woods in Como Park (left photo).

In 2013, people from anywhere in the world will be able to participate in the **Great Backyard Bird Count**! Save the dates, and participate in the first worldwide Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC), **Friday, February 15 through Monday, February 18, 2013.** 



More accurate GBBC location data will make your observations more use-

ful and easier for you to track over time. Although the GBBC is a four-day project, you will be able to use your account to track your bird sightings year round in the **eBird** database at www.ebird.org. Interactive maps allow you to explore bird observations in much greater detail than ever before. If you have never submitted a checklist to **eBird** before, you will need to create a user name and password. You'll be able to keep the same user name and password for the Great Backyard Bird Count in February!
