## **Midwest Peregrine Falcon Restoration**

with **Amber Burnette** Program Associate, The Raptor Center

#### February 14, 2013

Peregrine Falcons were mostly extirpated by the mid-1960s over much of North America, east of the Rocky Mountains and south of the Arctic due in large part to widespread use of pesticides, most notably DDT.

Restoration efforts began in the eastern states with the first experimental releases in the mid-1970s. In 1982, Patrick Redig of The Raptor Center, and Harrison Tordoff of the Bell Museum of Natural History and Department of Ecology, Evolution, and Behavior (University of Minnesota) released peregrines in the Midwest. What has emerged is a well-documented story of a population of peregrines that started at zero and is now close to carrying capacity, nesting on a variety of sites: cliffs, smokestacks, buildings, and bridges. The restored

population in the Midwest now inhabits 13 states and parts of two provinces.

Ms. Burnette will cover some of the background and history of the successful reintroduction of peregrines in the Midwest, as well as the contributions of Dr. Harrison, (Bud)

Tordoff and Dr. Patrick Redig. She will also cover some information on individual birds with noted longevity, productivity and distance from fledge site.



## **FASCINATION!!**


Intimate Glimpses of One of the Most Endangered Birds on Earth

On a tussock in arctic Russia a tiny russet bird opens its curious, flattipped bill. Out issues a

sharp trilling full of lungpower and tenacity. The bird's singing pays off, attracting a mate for the cold Siberian summer. A few weeks later, two impossibly fluffy chicks emerge from the nest to take their first steps on wobbly black legs. They are the next generation of critically endangered Spoon-billed Sandpipers—as few as 100 breeding pairs remain.

The Cornell Lab's cameras were there (in a concealed blind) to capture the nesting cycle in high definition video for the first time ever—images we're using to raise awareness about the plight of shorebirds migrating along the East Asian-Australasian Flyway. Watch this series of videos that documents breeding and nesting behavior, and/or read the full story, at www.birds.cornell.edu.





Many birders are aware that some of the Fr world's best birding is reavailable right here in Th Minnesota! During the spring by migration one of the best "V locations to be looking for so birds are along the northsouth Mississippi and bir

St. Croix River Flyways.

Our annual Warbler Weekend is located on Lake Pepin near Old Frontenac and the State Park, *right on the flyway*!

Our annual weekends over the last 30-40 years have averaged 130-135 species, including an average of 21-24 species of warblers. You may bird by car, on foot on area and Frontenac State Park trails, or simply by relaxing on the lawn. In addition to this informal style of birding, the Chapter's Field Trip leaders offer bird walks for beginner, medium, and experienced birders. Several locations are always canvassed, including Sand Point, Hok-Si-La (a Lake City Park), Well's Creek, and the State Park's prairie restoration project, located northwest of the Villa Maria. We maintain a Bird Board during the weekend, so if you see that there's a Kentucky Warbler about <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile from your location, you may have to decide whether to come for lunch, or, see the bird.

Our accommodate site has changed registration policies. They would like registration 30 days in advance, and do not send refunds for cancellations received after April 11TH. Last year we had to turn some people away because the weekend was oversubscribed, so please register early!! We ran out of food last year, so we have created meal tickets and a \$10 commuter charge for people attending evening lectures or coming for meals who are not staying overnight. For confirmation of your registration, please send an e-mail, or, enclose a selfaddressed stamped envelope with your registration. Accommodations include dorm-style rooms, shared bathrooms, and dining at very reasonable prices (only single rooms have increased in cost compared to last year). Note the early registration deadline of April 11.

Camping is available, either on the grounds at our accommodation, or at nearby Frontenac State Park.

Traditional events are counting the Chimney Swifts entering the very tall chimney at dusk; and Friday and Saturday evening owl walks (bring flashlights and dark sweat-shirts!) Saturday's lecture will be by Jennifer Vieth from the Carpenter Nature Center, and will feature two live raptors.

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## Birds Triumph Over the Cold

#### With enough food and the world's best insulation, birds can laugh at winter's blasts.

Even on the coldest days, dark little juncos hop under feeders, flashy red cardinals scratch under a pine tree, a natty nuthatch spirals down a tree trunk and big blue jays muscle in for a meal.

"Brrrrr," we shudder, "how can they stand this cold?" But if we think about it for a minute, we realize that our one always-reliable defense against winter's blasts is that down coat hanging in the closet. Down coats are filled with feathers, the best insulator in the world, and all birds are covered by feathers.

Their plumage, layer upon layer of feathers, keeps out the cold. But that's only half the survival story: Birds consume calories during all the daylight hours in winter to stoke their inner furnaces, thereby maintaining a constant body

temperature. Yes, the primary winter activity of the birds in our backyards is foraging and eating.

The winter landscape may look barren to us, but not to the hardy birds that live and even thrive at our latitude. Their sharp eyes detect shriveled berries on tree and bush, their probing beaks pull out insect eggs and caterpillars hidden in tree bark and on conifer needles, and flower heads offer abundant seeds to finches and sparrows.

#### Stopping in Again

Some 15 species of winter-resident birds - cardinals, chickadees, several kinds of woodpeckers, nuthatches, house finches and goldfinches, blue jays, crows, juncos, starlings, house sparrows, kinglets and brown creepers may flit through a landscape, including your backyard, several times a day! Many of these have favorite feeding sites and travel in small flocks on a circuit between them on a daily basis.

Summer's sweet berries are long gone (the grape, mulberry, dogwood and choke cherry fruit), but harder, even shriveled berries now become popular. Hackberry trees host big flocks of birds, especially robins that spend the winter. Several kinds of viburnum bushes, especially nannyberry and arrow-wood, hold berries that ripen late in the season, and these are eagerly snapped up by birds.

In fact, noted biologist Bernd Heinrich, in his book, "Winter World," closely watched the shrubs in the beaver bog behind his cabin. In typical meticulous fashion, he

#### Wild Cuisine

Naturalists note that our bird feeders provide only about 25 percent of the calories a bird eats each winter day. The rest comes from the wild:

- American Goldfinches gather in fields to consume ragweed, thistle and goldenrod seeds;
- Black-capped Chickadees busily search for eggs of small insects and spiders in bark and on pine needles:
- Northern Cardinals form loose flocks to forage for berries, seeds and fruit:
- White-breasted Nuthatches are the "head down" birds, descending tree trunks to search for insect material in bark crevices (they also cache a lot of food to eat later);
- Downy Woodpeckers peck at shallow bark and goldenrod galls to snare insect larvae and eggs, and they also eat fruit:
- bigger woodpeckers, like the hairys and red-bellieds, use their large beaks to drill into wood in search of insect larvae;
- Dark-eyed Juncos are ground feeders, searching for dropped seeds;
- American Crows roam for corn in harvested fields, weed seeds and berries, plus 25% of their diet is made up of roadkill and garbage.

But winter's birds still appreciate well-stocked feeders as a reliable source of energy on a cold winter day. Anything more than a dusting of snow can be a problem for ground feeding birds, since it covers up much of their food. So let's vow to sweep snow away from spots favored by ground feeding birds, and hang more feeders this winter and keep them stocked with seed and suet. And consider adding a heater to your birdbath, I can't emphasize this enough - birds need to drink, even on the coldest days. A reliable source of open water will bring in more of the neighborhood's birds than your feeders do.
