# "History and Purpose of MN Scientific and Natural Areas" with Kelly Randall Thursday, October 12, 2017



There are 164 Scientific and Natural Areas (SNA's) around the state of Minnesota. The purpose of the MNDNR SNA program is to "preserve natural features and rare resources of exceptional scientific and educational value." The natural

areas within SNA's include native plant communities, rare species, and geologic features of statewide significance.

Kelly Randall is the outreach coordinator for Minnesota SNA's. He has worked 25 years with MNDNR. Part of his job involved assessing and designating these unique lands. SNA's include representatives of rare or uncommon species and geology types in the four biomes around the state. Parts of shorelines, remnant prairies, blufftops, and old growth forest are safeguarded in the SNA inventories. The Piping Plover is one rare bird that has benefitted from the SNA program.

Randall's talk will review the process of identifying unique species and habitats and the lengthy designation process. He will feature a number of SNA's from different parts of the state. Many SPAS members are familiar with some of the SNA's. Some members will have hiked on some, looking for and identifying its unique species. As conservationists, we appreciate the role of SNA's in protecting land and species as part of our natural heritage and for future generations.

## Sandhill Cranes at Crex Meadows SWA

### Tuesday, October 17, 4:00-8:15 PM

Nine million year old fossils of Sandhill Cranes

have been found in the Midwest! In historic times. Greater Sandhill Cranes have congregated by the thousands every autumn evening in the marshes and ponds now called Crex Meadows, located on the north side of Grantsburg, WI. People likewise gather to witness the sight of seemingly never ending strands and haunting sounds as the birds seek and settle into shelter for the night. Perhaps this is your year to experience anew or again this enduring ritual.

Meet at 4:00 PM at the Visitors Center (VC) at Crex Meadow State Wildlife Area in Grantsburg WI. We will talk briefly about the cranes, Crex, and carpooling and leave from the

VC about 4:30 PM returning about 8:15 PM to the same parking lot. The VC closes at 4:30 PM.

There might be a group carpooling from the Twin Cities about noon; check with Louise in September if you are interested in that.

**LOCATION** Crex Meadows State Wildlife Area 102 E Crex Ave, Grantsburg, Wisconsin 54840 **SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS** Dress for cooling temperatures during the evening, bring spotting scope if you have one, sunscreen, bug spray, and a brimmed hat. We will carpool from the Visitors Center. **DIRECTIONS** Take I-35 North to the Rock Creek/ Grantsburg Exit (Highway 70), approximately 34 miles from Forest Lake. Take exit and turn right (EAST) on Highway 70. Follow for 15 miles (into Wisconsin) to the stop light in Grantsburg. Turn left (NORTH) onto Pine Street. Follow the goose signs through town to the Visitor Center, located on the NE corner of the junction of County Rd "D" and County Road "F." It is 52 miles from Forest Lake to the Visitors Center. Meet in the VC parking lot at 4:00. **REGISTRATION** Register with Louise Eidsmoe DIFFICULTY Easy. In an effort to not spook the

# MOU Paper Session Moves to Landscape Arboretum Saturday, December 2,

4:00–8:15 PM The Minnesota Ornithologist Union (MOU) annual Paper Session will be held at the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum on Saturday, December 2. In the past, the Paper Sessions have always been held at the Bell Museum of Natural History on the Minneapolis campus of the University of Minnesota. As the museum transitions to its new home in a brand new building on the St. Paul campus, the MOU continues to

work with the museum and its staff on future collaborative events and opportunities.

However, the new Bell Museum will not have a space large enough to hold an event for the number of people who attend the Paper Session each year, so the MOU has changed locale to the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum in Chanhassen.

The Arboretum is well known to birders, who have traveled there two years in a row to see the Summer Tanagers that have taken refuge there, as well as a fascinating variety of other birds attracted by the lush habitat.

The arboretum has undergone some major changes of its own in the last fifteen years, adding a larger visitor center that not only looks beautiful and is more functional but also contains a state-ofthe-art auditorium for hosting larger events, the MacMillan Auditorium. # **Our Chapter's Conservation Committee**

The biggest news in our committee is the development of a birding app for phones! Matt Jacobson, working with an intern at the University of Minnesota, has developed a prototype app for finding birding sites in Ramsey and Washington County. When the app is opened, the user will be able to see a map of the area, and click on any markers that identify a birding site. Each marker will have specific directions to find the site, along with notes for the user to provide more information. We are hoping to get more birding sites included, so please contact Matt to share! We need as many as possible.

We are scheduled to be at Hidden Falls on September 30 to provide breakfast and birding hikes to participants. In other news, Julian Sellers is working to expand the kestrel program. Through the SPAS chair, Brian Goodspeed, he has contacted managers of 4 state parks in the area that are conducive to kestrel nesting sites to ask if kestrel boxes can be posted in their park. Two have given positive responses so far, and we are continuing to pursue the remaining two sites. Fingers crossed for baby kestrels next spring!

One new focus for SPAS has been to develop a more visible presence in Washington County. Our first step in that direction is an alliance with the St. Croix River Association. We are excited and honored to be co-sponsors of a fund raising event for them in early October. We'll be sure to update you in the next Cardinal edition.
